Save heirloom vegetable and flower varieties from extinction and celebrate with us at Old Sturbridge Village! The Annual Home Gardeners' Exhibit will be held on September 18-19, 2010. If you have exhibited in the past, we welcome you back. If you haven't exhibited before, we invite you to plant some history this season and bring your harvest to the exhibit. Young Gardeners have their own exhibit division, and we encourage their participation. You will find entry rules, class lists of eligible varieties, and exhibit instructions in this brochure.

Each exhibitor will receive a certificate of exhibition. Entries will be judged for Best of Show, with a blue ribbon award going to the first-place entry in each class. The team of judges will be led by Village Horticulture Consultant Paul Rogers.

This year we are adding a new category. The "OSV Select" category will consist of entries grown from seed planted during a visit to Old Sturbridge Village.

- ### ENTRY RULES
1. Entries are open to the general public and museum staff.
 2. Entries will be exhibited and judged in two divisions: Young Gardener (ages 5-12) and Adult Gardener.
 3. There is no entry fee and no limit to the number of classes that may be entered. A one-day complimentary admission ticket will be issued per exhibitor for either September 18 or 19.
 4. Each entry must have been grown by the exhibitor.
 5. Each entry must meet the entry criteria in the class description.
 6. Heirloom vegetable varieties eligible for entry are listed in the class descriptions. Heirloom flower and herb varieties eligible for entry are limited to the open-pollinated flower and herb varieties offered for sale by Old Sturbridge Village. Seeds and plants may be purchased at the Museum Gift Shop. Seeds may be ordered by mail or online at www.osvgifts.org.
 7. Pre-registration is due by September 15 **ONLY ONE EXHIBITOR PER ENTRY FORM, PLEASE.** (Entry form may be copied.)
 8. Entries may be delivered on Friday, Sept. 17, between 1:00 and 4:00 pm, or Saturday, Sept. 18, between 9:00 and 10:00 am. Entries may be picked up on Sunday, Sept. 19, between 3:00 and 4:30 pm.

Section I: Heirloom Vegetables

Classes 1 - 47

To be eligible for a premium, each entry must have been grown by the exhibitor and meet the following entry criteria:

- BEANS:** six fresh pods or one-half cup of dry beans
Exhibitors may enter more than one variety, fresh and dried.

 2. Pole Bean: Asparagus, Scarlet Runner, Wren's Egg
- BEETS:** three roots with tops

- CABBAGE:** one head with good wrapper leaves

11. Danvers Half Long Carrot

- MELON:** one ripe melon
15. Green Nutmeg Melon
 16. Citron Watermelon
- ONIONS:** one braid of six onions
17. Red Wethersfield Onion
 18. White Portugal Onion
- PARSNIPS:** three roots without tops
19. Student Parsnip
 20. Hollow Crown Parsnip
- PEPPER:** six peppers
21. Cayenne Pepper
- POTATO:** three potatoes
22. Green Mountain Potato
- PUMPKIN:** one pumpkin
23. Connecticut Field Pumpkin
 24. Long Island Cheese Pumpkin
 25. Mammoth Pumpkin
- WINTER RADISHES:** three roots with or without tops
26. Black Spanish Radish
 27. China Rose Radish
- RUTABAGA:** one root without top
28. American Purple Top Rutabaga
- SALSIFY:** three roots without tops
29. Salsify
- SQUASH:** one squash, edible stage
30. Yellow Crookneck Summer Squash
 31. White Bush Scallop Summer Squash
 32. Long Pie Pumpkin Winter Squash
 33. Green Striped Cushaw Winter Squash
 34. Canada Crookneck Winter Squash
 35. Neck Pumpkin Winter Squash
 36. Boston Marrow Winter Squash

- TOMATOES:** six tomatoes
37. Brandywine Tomato
 38. Large Red Tomato
 39. Yellow Pear Tomato
- TURNIP:** three roots without tops
40. Orange Jelly Turnip
- LARGEST VEGETABLE BY WEIGHT:** one vegetable
41. Connecticut Field Pumpkin
 42. Mammoth Pumpkin
 43. Large Red Mangel Wurtzel
- BASKET OF VEGETABLES**
44. A collection of six or more vegetables from the varieties listed above, attractively displayed in a basket.
- VEGETABLE OF DISTINCTION**
Any pre-1900 heirloom variety is eligible in this class
45. One heirloom vegetable or a vegetable construction to be judged on its unique character, personality, and creative merit.
- LARGEST NUMBER OF VEGETABLES**
46. An award will be given to the exhibitor with the largest number of vegetable varieties exhibited in Classes 1-43
- OSV SELECT**
47. Beans grown from seed planted at OSV during a "plant a seed" activity. Six fresh pods or one-half cup of dry beans.

Section II: Heirloom Flowers and Herbs

Classes 48-52

Each entry must have been grown and arranged by the exhibitor. Eligible varieties are limited to flower and herb varieties offered for sale, or in garden workshops, at Old Sturbridge Village. Seeds and plants may be purchased at the Museum Gift Shop, and seeds may be ordered by mail or online at www.osvgifts.org

- POTTED PLANT**
48. Herb/Flower Plant(s) growing in a flowerpot suggesting the period 1790-1840
- NOSEGAY**
49. Fresh Flowers/Herbs in a hand-sized arrangement, tied with a ribbon, and exhibited in a glass tumbler
- PARLOR BOUQUETS**
50. Fresh Flowers/Herbs arranged in a container suggesting the period 1790-1840
 51. Dried Flowers/Herbs arranged in a container suggesting the period 1790-1840
- LARGEST SUNFLOWER**
52. Judged by the diameter of the seed head
